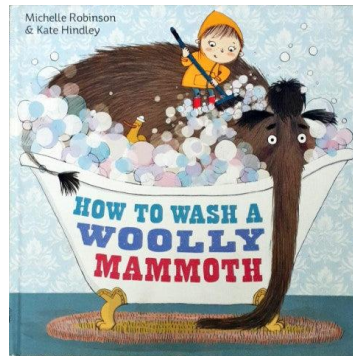

Wimbledon is the world's oldest tennis tournament. It is held at the All England Club in Wimbledon in London. It is one of the four grand slam tennis tournaments.

What Happens at Wimbledon?

Wimbledon has 15 different tennis events. There are five main events.

- Men's singles
- Ladies' singles
- Men's doubles
- Ladies' doubles
- Mixed doubles

Did You Know...?

- Lots of people watching the tennis at Wimbledon enjoy eating strawberries and cream.
- All Wimbledon tennis players must wear all-white clothing.



The winning male player is presented with a silver trophy. The winning female player is presented with a silver dish. The winners also receive prize money.

The matches are watched closely by an umpire on a tall chair. Ballboys and ballgirls are trained to help to collect the balls on the courts.

How Long Does Wimbledon Last?

Wimbledon begins in June and ends in July. The main show courts are Centre Court and Number 1 Court. Wimbledon normally lasts for two weeks per year but it can last for three weeks if there has been lots of rain. There is usually no play on the 'Middle Sunday'.

Did You Know...?

Wimbledon's Centre Court has a moving roof which can be closed over the court.

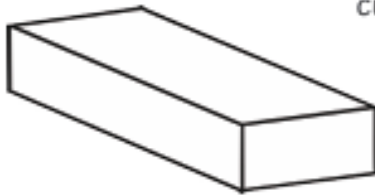

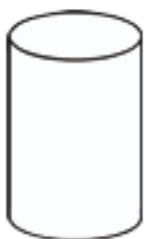
